### 1. CALL TO ORDER, ROLL CALL, PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE AND INVOCATION

#### 4. CITIZEN COMMENTS

Mark Billings of Habitat for Humanity, 240 N Ridgewood Avenue, thanked Council and staff for their service and involvement with affordable housing. He gave an overview of the work Habitat was doing in the community and invited everyone out to their upcoming home dedication.

Bob Perry, 608 Midfield Loop, discussed a piece of property that Habitat is hoping to acquire from the City and thanked the City for their help.

Mayor Depew expressed his appreciation for Habitat for Humanity and all they do for the community.

Keith Dean, 2723 Victory Palm Drive, stated issues he had with the City regarding development and affordability.

City Manager Irby requested Council pull item 10c.

# 6. CITY COUNCIL REPORTS

Councilwoman Dolbow reported that she had attended an event at Indian River Elementary; a Habitat for Humanity home dedication; the Pirates on the Edge event; the Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day event, she gave special recognition to Mr. Visconti, a World War 2 vet who was a

founder. She shared that the animal shelters new building is going up which will give them 25 more kennels

Councilman Powers had nothing at this time.

Mayor Depew had attended a Chamber of Commerce Ambassador meeting; a YMCA board meeting; Indian River Elementary Schools Government Day; several political events; a Governor DeSantis event; a Habitat for Humanity dedication; a Volusia County Citizens Academy meeting; a Volusia County Mayor Roundtable meeting; the National Southeast Volusia Chamber of Commerce meeting; a Florida League of Mayors event and conference; the Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day and the New Smyrna Beach Christmas parade. He reminded everyone that the Wreaths Across America event was coming up.

Mayor Depew stated that an administrative mistake had been made regarding the Citizen Recognition Program, resulting in the Outstanding Citizen Award going to a non-resident. He does stand behind his initial nomination but understands the upset it caused. He proposed, with Councils support, to nominate Gary D. Snider to be co-Grand Marshall.

Councilwoman Gillis had attended a Southeast Chamber Ambassador meeting; Indian River Elementary Schools Government Day; a Habitat for Humanity dedication and groundbreaking; a County class on aviation and economic development; a tour of the airport; the Amvets Veterans Day Ceremony; the Pirates on the Edge event; the Pirates Ball, she thanked Edgewater Police and Fire for their presence; a Cuda's Unhooked community meeting; a Friends of the Edgewater Public Library meeting; SAC and PTA meetings at Edgewater Public and New Smyrna Beach Middle school; the Chamber of Commerce annual meeting; a County Citizens Academy on water, resources and mosquito control; a City budget meeting; a community clothing swap in Florida Shores; the Florida League of Cities Legislative Action conference; the New Smyrna Beach Christmas parade and the Amvets Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day Ceremony. She had met with several HOAS; City Manager Irby; Development Services Director Ryan Solstice and had received positive remarks from residents about Officer Nolan and Officer Checksfield.

Councilwoman Gillis brought up signage in the City and asked if it were possible to temporarily waive the Code Enforcement regulations on it as they workshop changing the Code as she believes it's affecting small businesses.

Council consensus was that the feather flags should be workshopped first to avoid confusion and lack of regulations.

The Preliminary Plat is for the recording of a 200-unit residential subdivision of single family detached for parcel generally located West of Volco Road.

Ryan Solstice, Development Services Director, provided a staff report and recommendation.

Joey Posey, 420 S Nova Road, attorney for the applicant and developer, provided a brief overview of the project and said he was available for any questions or concerns.

Mayor Depew opened the public hearing.

Councilman Powers stated that as they are in the final plat process, they are bound by case law to

approve unless they're violating their development plan or code. He added that this was approved by previous Council.

Mayor Depew agreed, reiterating that this was not a new subdivision being approved.

**d.** 1859 Pine Tree Drive Foreclosure/Donation Recommendation

Mayor Depew opened the public hearing.

Tanya Plaut, Attorney for the Board of Southeast Volusia Habitat for Humanity, expressed concerns over the possible condemnation of the home; Mr. Irby said that Habitats contractors had looked at it and believed they could rehabilitate it, it will just need to be gutted. Mr. Irby assured her that as long as Habitat moves quickly and in good faith, they should be okay.

Mayor Depew felt this was a wonderful thing as the property had been in disrepair for years and it will create a sense of affordable housing.

Councilman Powers stated that continuing to partner with Habitat for Humanity adds tremendous value to the community.
